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Segment.01 Hello. I'm Jerry Scheidbach, pastor of the Lighthouse, and your brain masseur—get ready for your brain massage.

Hello to all my new friends in Washington — I had a wonderful time in the Emerald State — by the way, we are working up a new website for the Brain Massage show that will have my traveling calendar posted.

Maybe they get addicted to the attention they receive to their sensationalist statements and lose their focus on objective truth and start going with anything that jazzes their audience—Or, maybe someone is slipping aspartame into their water, or something! hahah.

Segment.02 Hello. Welcome back! I'm Jerry Scheidbach, pastor at the Lighthouse, your brain masseur, and Paul Revere's lantern lighter, lighting the lamps in the church belfry arch, signaling the enemy is on the march, an enemy that would steal from us our liberty.

Ran a bit over time in the first segment. Trump whines when he loses because he has built his campaign on winning—and he has to provide a rationale his supporters can deal with when he loses.

I want to address some of the negatives brought to my attention about Cruz—those that are related to his connection to the various conspiracy theories about globalization, and subordinating American sovereignty to the UN and so forth, will be addressed in

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my series Sunday nights over the next several weeks as I separate the sensational from the sensible concerns—not directly related to Cruz, by the way—but indirectly! When you rightly understand the sense of these conspiracy theories and separate from that the sensationalists overlay that distorts the true picture — the rest falls into place and the bottom line is that Cruz in no way has any interest in subordinating America's national Sovereignty to the UN or any other power outside of the U.S. or that is extra-Constitutional — that is, outside of the authority of the Constitution — he is a Constitutionalist conservative. He is no more involved in any conspiracy to overthrow the Republic than was George Washington. He is the most Washingtonian presidential candidate to come along in a very long while. However, one thing has come up lately that will not likely be addressed in my series—allegations that Cruz is not a sincere Christian because he uses foul language. I think he offended the sensibilities of some Christians when he said to Trump, "Leave Heidi the H- alone."

Now, the word *hell* is a Bible word, but we certainly don't approve of trivializing such a solemn subject as hell fire—

And, I am aware of my audience, that many of you are not Christians, although if my feedback is reflective of my audience, most of you are. I also know that probably most of the Christians I have in my audience are like most Christians today, and are regularly exposed to words like *hell*, and *damn*, and, well some other expletives — and probably would not make an issue of Cruz' statement.

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I'm guessing that any Christian who feels he or she cannot vote for Cruz because he used the word *hell* as curse, or a profane way, a profanity, to express anger, will certainly not vote for Trump who drops the 'F' bomb repeatedly in some of his rallies—vulgarizing God's marriage gift, and joining that growing chorus who favor the use of that term, practically as a shibboleth identifying those who wish to distance themselves from our "old fashioned" Christian influenced cultural values, "whose mouth is full of cursing and bitterness." Romans 3:14

I certainly do not approve of Cruz' use of that language. However, I don't think too many of us would not be willing to cut him some slack if this was not his customary manner of speech, especially given the circumstance in which it was provoked—no excuse—but, still!

Also, and I might lose some of my more fastidious Christian support here—but I don't think, if that is the extent of the accusation, he told Trump to "Leave Heidi the H- alone" — no, that is not enough for me to say I can't vote for Cruz. Many of you, especially those of you who grew up in secular schools, and perhaps in non-Christian homes, find yourself slipping with an H-word from time to time.

But this gives me an opportunity to address something I think that is very important.

No candidate is going to be a perfect specimen of holiness. Our Founders certainly were not! As for our Pastors, there is quite a bit of variety of colorfulness in personalities, shall we say—some that goes way too far, in my opinion. How holy must a candidate be?

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It's interesting that the qualifications outlined in Deuteronomy 17:15-17 do not stipulate any standard that Abraham, or David, did not meet—these are great leaders chosen by God to lead His people, and they were not perfectly consistent examples of godliness, or holiness.

Anyway, let's take up the constant drone string—Cruz is a liar!

It reminds me of when the Dems go on and on about Bush is a liar, there were no WMDs. Fact, WMDs were found—although never in the abundance anticipated. Fact, many reliable sources offered testimony and compelling evidence that Iraq moved their WMDs out of the country before — but this has never been proved.
